

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA AT CHAPEL HILL Fact Sheet | Incoming Exchange Program & Global Visiting Student Program

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill was founded in 1793 as the first public state university in the young United States. Since then, it has grown into one of the most renowned teaching and research universities in the country and internationally, and ranks highly on a global scale. Chapel Hill is a small college town with roughly 60,000 residents, of which 20,800 are undergraduate students and 12,500 are graduate students. The area boasts rich cultural, historic, dining, and sports opportunities that allow students to experience college and community life in the United States.

Although Chapel Hill itself is small, Raleigh, the capital city of North Carolina is only 30 minutes away, and Washington DC can be reached in around 4 hours. The university is also within close driving distance to the beach and the Blue Ridge Mountains. Rolling hills, gentle winters, and picturesque dairy farms all add to the lovely setting of Chapel Hill, which is known as the Southern Part of Heaven.

Application Process

Application Requirements

The online application includes:

- Official transcript
- Proof of English Proficiency (if applicable)
- Essay
- Signature documents

Eligibility

Note: Check with your home university for their requirements which may be higher.

- **GPA:** Minimum 2.8/4.0
- English Language Proficiency:
 - TOEFL 85
 - IELTS 6.0
 - Cambridge English First test B2 on the CEFR
 - Duolingo 130 or higher

Application Period

Spring/Calendar Year

- Nomination opens: August 1
- Nominations due: September 1
- Application Deadline: September 15

Fall/Summer/Academic Year

- Nomination opens: December 1
- Nominations due: February 15
- Application Deadline: March 1

Immunizations

Students will be responsible for providing proof of immunizations upon their arrival to campus, no later than 30 days from the start of classes. Visit **https://campushealth.unc.edu/services/immunizations** for information on required immunizations. Step-by-step instructions on how to complete the Medical History and Immunization Forms will be available to exchange students post-acceptance.

Health Insurance

All students are required to have health insurance coverage. International students can enroll in the university insurance program, Student Blue. Exchange students can waive the Student Blue insurance and substitute it for a preferred insurance policy. Preferred policies must meet the following requirements:

- Minimum total benefit/coverage of \$100,000 (USD) per accident or illness
- Plan deductible of no more than \$500 (USD)
- Minimum of \$50,000 (USD) for medical evacuation
- Minimum of \$25,000 (USD) for repatriation
- Policy must be active for the entire duration of the academic semester

Students cannot start the process of waiving out of the mandatory insurance until after acceptance to the exchange program. More details about the specific waiver process will be provided post-acceptance.

Medical Care

International students at UNC are eligible to use the university's Campus Health Service (CHS), which can provide care for minor illnesses and accidents, immunizations, injections, and other medical services. For specialized treatment, students are referred to medical specialists in the community. Visa and Orientation Information

Visa

International exchange students will apply for a J-1 Non-Degree student visa. This visa will allow you to enter the US 30 days prior to the program start date and depart the US 30 days after the program end date listed on the Form DS-2019. Proof of funds for an academic semester and/or year is required to be issued a Form DS-2019.

Mandatory Orientation

All exchange students and Global Visiting Students are required to attend orientation at the start of the exchange program. Orientation is scheduled the day before the first day of class (FDOC).
